

PORTER COUNTY MUSEUM JOINS THE CONVERSATION ON VALPARAISO ARTS DISTRICT

Valpo NEXT, the city's recent planning initiative, wrapped up in 2014, and now it's time to put the plan in action. As part of the Valpo NEXT initiative and as part of Valparaiso's vie for America's Best Community, the city has asked community members for their input on developing an arts and culture district in downtown Valparaiso. The Museum was happy to host one of these conversations during the summer.

During the open house, attendees were asked to identify assets, ask questions, express concerns, and give their big ideas for a proposed arts district on Indiana Avenue in Valparaiso. The conversation continued during a summit event at the newly opened Urschel Pavilion in downtown Valparaiso, where representatives from Planning NEXT were on hand to collect residents' big ideas.

FROM THE CHAIR

As you can see with our latest exhibit, Neighbors: Stories of Community in Northwest Indiana, the Museum is engaged in presenting the history of our county and surrounding areas. History is not always comfortable, nor should it be. Fact checking and a balanced perspective are hallmarks of an intelligent, well-thought-out presentation. October got off to a great start with the We Are Porter County Series installment of a tour of the (normally locked) Old City Cemetery on Union Street. Steven Mockler of the David D. Porter Camp #106 of the Sons of the Union Veterans told stories of a few of our local Civil War vets and I chimed in with about some of the more colorful Porter County characters taking up residence in the cemetery since 1839. If you missed out, be sure to join us for another tour on Saturday, October 17 at 2p or a veteran-focused tour at 3p.

Lastly, things are progressing nicely with our expansion project at 16 Indiana Avenue. Façade work begins October 16 and will wrap up, weather permitting, in mid-March 2016. We are all working very diligently behind-the-scenes to prepare our final plans for the last and largest phase of this project. I am working closely with the Board of the Museum Foundation to finalize the details of our capital campaign, which should move into the quiet phase before the end of this calendar year.

If you have not visited to see our new Neighbors exhibit, please make plans to do so. It is the most powerful exhibit our team has ever undertaken. Many thanks to Heath Carter and the students of his Hands-on History course at Valparaiso University for making it all possible.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTED ART VALPARAISO OPENS

SECOND SEASON OF CSA VALPO FEATURES EIGHT NEW LOCAL ARTISTS!



The Porter County Museum is excited to announce that Community Supported Art Valparaiso is back for a second season featuring eight new literary and visual artists. These emerging and mid-career artists from Porter, Lake, and Laporte counties work in a variety of media, including painting, printmaking, poetry, mixed media, and jewelry.

Over the last twenty years, Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) has become a popular way for consumers to buy seasonal food directly from local farms. With the same "buy local" spirit in mind, the Community Supported Art (CSA) Valpo project aims to support local art, artists, and collectors.



Shareholders in CSA Valpo support new works by these artists created uniquely for this project, and have the opportunity to meet the artists and other arts supporters at a variety of events. Only fifty shares are sold each season, and cost \$150. Shares in CSA Valpo go on sale October 1, and eight original works of art, one from each artist, are delivered to shareholders during a pick-up celebration in the spring of 2016.



The Porter County Museum is delighted to host a season preview exhibition of the artists from December 5, 2015 - February 27, 2016. The Porter County Museum's ongoing collaboration with CSA Valpo has brought many new visitors to the Museum, and offered new and varied exhibitions to Museum patrons and members. The Museum is happy to have the chance to display the work of eight new, talented artists, and support the arts in Northwest Indiana.

NEIGHBORS: STORIES OF COMMUNITY

NEW EXHIBIT EXPLORES THE COMPLEX HISTORY OF RACE RELATIONS IN THE REGION

On September 26, the Porter County Museum opened a new exhibit, *Neighbors: Stories of Community in Northwest Indiana*. The exhibit emerged as a collaboration between Valparaiso University's Hands on History Class, who researched the complex history of civil rights and race relations in Lake and Porter Counties.

The exhibit asks visitors to reflect upon what it means to be a neighbor. By telling stories of inclusion and exclusion from the history of Porter and Lake Counties, the exhibit investigates how communities are imagined, formed, and change over time.


Visitors to the exhibit experience the Region's history chronologically from the settling of the Region through the present, learning of early interactions with Native Americans, the economic forces that pulled diverse groups of people to Lake and Porter Counties, and exclusionary practices, such as "sundown" laws, that were instituted in growing communities. The exhibit also discusses efforts to remove difference during times of economic hardship, and, conversely, organizations' efforts at integration. These stories are contextualized with a timeline of significant national civil rights events, as well as local and national statistics. While the exhibit describes a difficult history that we are no doubt living out today, more importantly, it asks us to imagine our futures, our neighbors, and how we wish to live in community together. What does it mean to be a good neighbor?

This exhibit represents many firsts for the PoCo Muse. *Neighbors* discusses a difficult history never before addressed by the Porter County Museum. It also broadens the scope of the Museum's focus, from Porter County to Lake and Laporte County neighbors. Finally, this exhibit is the first designed to be a travelling exhibit, which will move in 2016.

Finally, this exhibit would not have been possible without the work of Dr. Heath Carter and Valparaiso University's Hands on History class. During the fall of 2014, the class collected research on many aspects of civil rights and race relations throughout the Region. Their work was integral in the creation of the exhibit.

FROM THE COLLECTION

This is an exciting time for the arts in Porter County as city planners and local artists work with the members of the community planning and developing an Arts and Culture District in Valparaiso. This initiative builds upon the existing efforts of already established local institutions that promote the arts, not the least of which is the Porter County Museum.


Significant support of the arts was shown by the Museum when it opened the Robert Cain Gallery. The exhibit of Robert Cain's artwork followed by exhibits of art from Community Supported Art (CSA) and the Enclave Project generated interest, attracted new visitors, and built on the Museum's traditions of promoting its own art through exhibits and of preserving the art it has in storage behind the scenes.



One notable piece of art in storage is the charcoal and ink sketch of the T. S. Bull residence and apiary by N. W. Wineland. Christian and Christina Green purchased the original acreage for this Washington Township farm after Christian became partially crippled from a log rolling off a wagon at his sawmill in Prattville. Son William took over the farm after Christian died, and after William's death, the farm was handed down to daughter, Helen, and her husband T. S. Bull.

A sketch by N. W. Wineland, very similar to the one of the Bull property, was featured on the Antiques Roadshow in 2012. The guest on the show presented a sketch depicting a group of Improved American Merino Sheep that had belonged to her ancestor, Isaiah McGinley of Valparaiso. The appraiser, who estimated the date of the work to be ca.1880, explained that the sketch was an example of folk art produced by itinerant artists who traveled the Midwest getting permission to sketch the property of prosperous farmers.

The sketch of the Bull residence and apiary is just one example of valued, historical art tucked away inside the Museum. There are many more. The Porter County Museum is not unlike other museums in having many more items in storage than on exhibit. Perhaps this puts the Museum in a rather enviable position. Not only does it have the privilege of promoting art, it has the privilege of preserving it as well.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY: 1915

OCTOBER, 1915

VALPO MAN HEARS TALK ACROSS THE OCEAN

For the first time in the history of the world, conversation spanned the Atlantic ocean last night by wireless telephone, and Valparaiso was abreast of the times. M.E. Packman, wireless expert of Dodge's Institute, in his laboratory, with instruments and equipment made by himself, recorded the messages as they passed from the Arlington station to Paris. The station here is the only one in the world, outside of New York, Honolulu, San Francisco, and Paris, with the apparatus of sufficient power for the reception of the aerial messages by wireless telephone. To Mr. Packman belongs the honor of the building and installing the instruments, in the basement of the wireless building of the local school.

Mr. Packman was sitting in his laboratory last night, endeavoring to pick up something from the atmosphere, while he waited for Mrs. Packman to return from a party. Suddenly into his ears came the call, "N.J. This is N.A.A." This continued for some time. Then distinctly came the voice, "Hello Parea; hello Parea. This is Webb talking." This was at 11:15, and Mr. Packman knew that Arlington was calling in an effort to reach Paris by wireless telephone. A successful feat heralded this morning by the press all over the world. At the time, he was searching with a wave length of 6,000 meters.

Then another voice came to the ears of the animated man in the Dodge laboratory, and it spoke in the French tongue.

"Parlez Vous Francais?" That's what is said, Mr. Packman told the interviewer today. "I don't know how to spell it."



MISTAKE OF CONTRACTOR CAUSES COMMENT TODAY

The name of "J. Lowenstine & Son," cut in glass over the [arch] of the Lowenstine store building, caused comment all over town this morning. The impression prevailed that one of the sons was leaving the firm. "It was just a mistake on the part of the contractor," laughed Maurice Lowenstine, when he was asked to explain. In a short time an "s" will be added, and both sons will again be represented.

All day today a gang of men tussled with the big plate glass that is being set into the show windows. Little by little they are being placed, and in a few days the big establishment will present a finished appearance from the outside.

COUNTY SCHOOLS & CITY TAKE CHRISTMAS VACATION

Schools all over the county, with scarcely an exception, will take the usual Christmas vacation of one week, according to the announcement of Superintendent Fred H. Cole today. Some will dismiss as early as Thursday night to allow those teachers far from home to reach the parental roof-tree in time to get their feet under the table for the feast. Occasionally, where time has been lost, a school will continue through next week to insure an earlier dismissal in the warm spring weather.

Valparaiso will resign itself to festivities. For the first time in the history of the city, most of the stores will be closed all day. Heretofore, the rule was to remain open a half day on Christmas that corrections might be made in the purchases of shoppers before. Barber shops will remain open until noon. Druggists have indicated that they will do business a good share of the day.


